## "A Pilgrim's Ponderings"

Dear friends in Christ:

Summer greetings! The weather here in Maine has at long last turned fair, warm, and beautiful. Between now and Columbus Day in October, many people will be traveling here to "Vacationland." It brings back memories of summers I spent as a kid with my family on Hoyt's Island on Great Pond in Belgrade Lakes. In a couple of days, Maury and I will have the good fortune to hop on a plane in Portland and fly out to Dayton, Ohio for a one week, Fourth of July trip to visit our son, Sam, his wife Ginny, and their two boys, our grandsons, Connor (8) and Evan (5). Obviously we can't wait to see the "Buckeye Dowses." It will be a good time to reconnect as a family, to celebrate our common bonds, to enjoy each other's company, and to resolve, once again, that though we are physically separated by one thousand miles, we can and will do everything we can to build strong, loving relationships between our three generations. We will remember where we came from as live in the present moment while preparing for the future.

There's another "family" reunion coming up in October. This year marks the 500<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Protestant Reformation. Of course, our spiritual roots as disciples of Jesus Christ go all the way back to Pentecost and the earliest days of Christianity. Our specific heritage as descendants of and adherents to what is known as the "free church" tradition has its origins at a particular time and place in history.

Reformers Martin Luther, Huldrych Zwingli, John Calvin, Thomas Cranmer, Balthasar Hubmaier,

William Tyndale and many others were used by God to bring about enormous changes in the ways Christians lived out their faith. Writing for Reformed *Worship* magazine, James R. Payton, Jr, professor emeritus of history at Redeemer University College, reminds us that *"politically, socially, economically, culturally, and in many other ways, the Reformation has helped us to mold the world we live in today."* 

Why did the Reformation happen? Does it still impact us today, and if so, how? What were some of the positive changes that came about, and what were some of the damaging excesses? We will have the opportunity this fall to ask these and other questions and learn more about the Reformation and its lasting influence.

Beginning on Sunday, October 22 and continuing for six Lord's Days through November 26, those interested in the subject will gather in the library after worship (bring along some snacks from the *Keep It Super Simple* refreshments table in the Fellowship Hall!) and watch a new DVD series called **"This Changed Everything."** It was produced by the well-respected **Christian History Institute**, publishers of the popular magazine *Christian History*. Please join us for what promises to be an enlightening experience!

I think this excellent resource will assist us in celebrating the 500<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Reformation. I trust that God will use it as a catalyst to help us rejoice in our spiritual family connections, celebrate our common heritage, strengthen our faith in the Lord as Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, and inspire us to act justly, love mercy, and walk humbly with our God (Micah 6:8).

I'll end this month's pastoral epistle with a few quotes from the Reformers.
